I. PURPOSE

This CBE First-Year Summer Start-Up Packet reviews what you need to do this summer for a smooth start to the fall. Please read this packet carefully, so you will be prepared to do essential pre-registration activities in June.

II. WHAT YOU NEED TO ACCOMPLISH THIS SUMMER

As a first-year student in the BS in Business and Economics program, you have five goals to accomplish this summer:

- 1. Check your Lehigh email at least twice a week to keep abreast of important messages from your CBE Undergraduate Programs Office team. When you arrive on campus, you should check your email at least daily. Please expect and read emails sent from the following important email addresses:
 - Dean Zalatan (deanzalatan@lehigh.edu)
 - CBE Undergraduate Programs Office (cbeundergraduate@lehigh.edu)
 - CBE Undergraduate Programs Office Advising Team (cbeadvising@lehigh.edu)
 - Your academic advisor, whom you will meet via email this June
- 2. Read this packet and note any questions you may have for your academic advisor in **June.** This packet details important information including:
 - A list of courses critical for you to include in your Fall 2018 schedule.
 - Placement guidelines for essential first-year course requirements, including math and English.
 - Guidelines for receiving AP credit across all disciplines for which Lehigh grants AP credit and/or for receiving college credit for courses taken in high school.
 - Guidelines for placement in foreign language courses, music courses and groups, and theatre.
- 3. **Meet your academic advisor via email this summer, and connect with your advisor to the extent necessary to achieve your CBE summer goals.** This June, you will be assigned an academic advisor who will be your advisor from your first year through your senior year. Your advisor will reach out to you via email this June to introduce himself or herself, provide information about how you can schedule an appointment with him or her, and provide you with a link to CBE *Soar in Four* expectations that describe the roles of

CBE advisors and advisees. You will be expected to acknowledge that you've read the CBE *Soar in Four* expectations via the link provided before you arrive on campus in August.

- 4. **Register for Fall 2018 courses online this July.** As a BS in Business and Economics degree student, you will be expected to complete a specific set of courses before the end of your first year at Lehigh. This July, Registration and Academic Services will open the online Banner system for you to enroll yourself into these courses. Please refer to the following website offered by Registration and Academic Services, which provides contacts should you have any registration-related questions, https://fysenroll.lehigh.edu/. Your academic advisor will also be available to answer your questions by email and by appointment throughout the online registration period.
- 5. Meet your CBE H.A.W.K.S. Peer Mentor virtually via email by August, and correspond to the extent necessary to answer any questions you have before you come to campus. Every student in the BS in Business and Economics program will be assigned a Peer Mentor who will be responsible for a small cohort of first-year business students who share similar academic interests. Your Peer Mentor will reach out to you by early August to welcome you to Lehigh, introduce himself or herself, and offer to answer any questions you might have as you prepare to come to campus. You will meet your Peer Mentor and the other students in your Mentor's group at CBE Convocation on August 24th. For more information about the H.A.W.K.S Peer Mentor program, please see section VII of this packet.

	Complete the online survey to acknowledge you've read the <i>CBE Soar in Four</i> expectations for CBE advisors and advisees.

	Watch for and read any emails from your academic advisor. He or she will examine the fall schedule of classes you chose in July and let you know if any changes are necessary.
	Participate in the CBE First-Year Student Convocation as part of your orientation on August 24 th . You will meet your academic advisor and your H.A.W.K.S. Peer Mentor

during a small-group workshop immediately following an assembly about CBE academic expectations. If you need any further schedule adjustments during the afternoon, your advisor will be available for a one-on-one meeting during walk-in hours in the CBE Undergraduate Programs Office.

□ Look for your first CBE Week at a Glance e-newsletter from the CBE Undergraduate Programs Office on Sunday evening, August 26th. The CBE Week at a Glance will keep you apprised of updates including advising office hours, professional development events, and study abroad planning opportunities.

IV. FIRST-YEAR CURRICULUM AND FALL SCHEDULE

Over the next two years, your goals as a CBE student will be to:

- Successfully complete the prescribed core curriculum in order to build the essential business concepts and skills that form the foundation for your major course of study.
- Begin developing into a well-rounded businessperson.
- Declare your major course of study in the second semester of your sophomore year.

A typical schedule for a first-semester CBE student ranges from 14-17 credits, with required courses and programs including:

Total credits: 14-17

First-year students are limited to taking a maximum of 17 credits in the first semester. Full-time student status requires at least 12 credits per semester. During the semester, you must be very careful if you decide to drop a course because it may put your total credits below 12. This will change your status from full-time to part-time. Part-time status may affect your eligibility for financial aid, athletics, medical insurance, and other areas.

Below is information that will be helpful as you register for Fall 2018:

- I. **BUS 001** Introduction to Business in a Global Environment: 3 credits
 - All CBE students must take this course in their first semester.
 - Full descriptions of BUS 001 and other Lehigh courses are available in the Lehigh Course Catalog: http://catalog.lehigh.edu/
- II. **ECO 001** Principles of Economics: 4 credits
 - Eco 001 is a required core course.
 - If you have AP or transfer credit for this course, please see section VI of this packet (Advanced Placement and College Credit).

III. ENGL 001 - Composition and Literature: 3 credits

- You are required to complete a total of 6 credits of English composition and literature.
- ENGL 001 should be taken in your first semester, followed by ENGL 002 in your second semester, unless you have AP, SAT Writing, or transfer credit for one or both of these courses. For International Students, English placement recommendations will come directly from the ESL department. Please see section VI of this packet (Advanced Placement and College Credit).

IV. CALCULUS

You are required to complete one 4-credit calculus course as part of your CBE core. You will be required to select a calculus course during the course registration process. There are two courses from which you may choose: (1) MATH 081 or (2) MATH 021. The math course that is right for you this fall will depend on several factors, including your goals and your academic history. Some general guidelines follow:

MATH 081

Students who do not expect to pursue a major or other studies involving advanced math typically enroll in MATH 081: *Calculus with Business Applications* in the fall of their first year at Lehigh. General indicators of readiness for MATH 081 typically include successful completion of calculus in high school and a reasonably strong score in standardized math exams (e.g., 620+ in the math section of the SAT). We expect that most CBE students will enroll in MATH 081.

MATH 021

Students who plan advanced study in mathematics and want to take math beyond the minimum required for the BS in Business and Economics degree typically select MATH 021: Calculus I. General indicators of readiness for MATH 021 include strong performance in calculus in high school and a very strong score on standardized math exams (e.g., 670+ in the math section of the SAT). MATH 021 is recommended for students wishing to:

 Pursue a BS degree which requires advanced math, e.g., a Finance major with an Analytical Finance Track (one out of 6 possible tracks) or a BS in Computer Science and Business (CSB). More information about CBE majors and tracks

- and other degrees available at Lehigh can be found on the CBE Undergraduate Programs Office website: https://cbeundergrad.lehigh.edu/curriculum.
- Pursue doctoral studies in business functional areas and/or in economics.
- Pursue a minor in Mathematics (including Probability & Statistics or Actuarial Science).

OTHER OPTIONS

- MATH 000 Preparation for Calculus. This course is for students who require some additional reinforcement in pre-calculus before moving onto MATH 081 the following semester. <u>The credits for this course do not count toward graduation, but they do count toward GPA.</u>
- **ADVANCED MATH STUDY.** If you earned AP credit for calculus and are considering advanced math study, please contact Professor Lee Stanley, ljs4@lehigh.edu, for placement advising (i.e., whether you should take MATH 022 this fall or start by taking MATH 021 at Lehigh).

If you are unsure about the best math option for you, please contact the CBE Undergraduate Advising Team at cbeadvising@lehigh.edu or (610) 758-3400 to schedule an appointment with your assigned academic advisor.

V. **Optional First Semester Elective**: 1-3 credits

- You are required to take a minimum of 48 credits outside of the College of Business and Economics during your four years at Lehigh. These courses consist of distribution requirements and electives outside of the business college. Course distribution designations appear in the University Catalog online at the end of each course description. The 15 credits of distribution requirements include the following:
 - Humanities (HU)—Minimum of 6 credits. Study of how we understand and record human experiences; teach you how to think creatively and critically about your own identities and connections to other. Humanities courses typically fall under the following departments: Art and Architecture, English, History, Modern Languages and Literature, Music, Philosophy, Religion Studies, and Theatre.
 - Social Sciences (SS)—Minimum of 6 credits. Study of human society and social relationships. Social Science courses are usually encompassed in the following departments: History, International Relations, Journalism and Communications, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, and Anthropology.
 - Natural Sciences (NS)—Minimum of 3 credits with no lab requirement. Study of physical sciences. Natural Sciences courses are available in the following departments: Astronomy, Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Earth and Environmental Sciences, and Physics.
 - You are also required to take courses that apply to the following two requirements: Global and Diversity. These courses may also count toward fulfilling other requirements, such as your distribution requirements or your non-CBE electives. Global and diversity courses are available in numerous departments at Lehigh.

Global – A minimum of 1 course (at least 3 credits). **Diversity** – A minimum of 1 course (at least 3 credits).

- You may also be able to earn credit for other activities you plan to do, e.g., earning 1 credit for participating in choir.
- Sophomore status (23 credits or more) is a requirement to request courses numbered 100 and above, so as a first-year student, you should request courses among those below 100. Some courses numbered below 100 have prerequisites or co-requisites. You will not be able to register for a course without having the required prerequisite (i.e., courses that must be successfully completed before you may register for a course) or co-requisite (i.e., more than one course that must be taken during the same academic term).

V. CBE ADVISING SYLLABUS/SOAR IN FOUR

The CBE Advising Syllabus/Soar in Four is an agreement between the student and the academic advisor that highlights the expectations for the student and the advisor. Participants and their advisor sign an agreement requiring both the student and their advisor to "check in" and review the student's progress each semester.

Participants

CBE Advising Syllabus/Soar in Four is designed for first-year and transfer CBE students.

Program Benefits

Students meet with their academic advisor and faculty mentor once a semester to discuss the current and future semesters. During the meeting, students discuss and plan future academic opportunities such as study abroad, internships, double majors, dual degrees, and minors that are possible during the student's four years at the University.

Students are encouraged to ask questions and discuss their future plans with their academic advisor. Early planning and research is the key to students taking full advantage of all the opportunities offered at Lehigh.

VI. Advanced Placement and College Credit

For your convenience, the following are some highlights of that policy, as well as college credit transfer policies.

AP Exam Scores

If you have taken, or plan to take, the College Board Advanced Placement Examinations, be sure to arrange to have the scores sent to Lehigh University (code 002365).

- **Do not wait** to receive your results before having them sent to Lehigh. A delay in reporting will result in delayed placement and course registration. Reporting a "low" score will not be to your disadvantage.
- Because you need to complete the Course Registration Process before we receive your AP exam scores, you should make your course selections as if you will not receive AP credit.
- When your AP scores are available, we can make the appropriate adjustments to your course schedule. Be sure to have your scores sent to Lehigh. An advisor may reach out to you through your Lehigh e-mail account regarding any course registration adjustments based on AP results. Please make sure to check your Lehigh e-mail on a regular basis.

English Composition Advanced Placement Policy

- If you earn a score of 4 on either of the English AP exams or a score of 700–749 on the SAT Writing, you will receive three credits for English 001. You will then complete the University's English requirement by taking English 011.
- If you earn a score of 5 on either of the English AP exams or a score of 750 or higher on the SAT Writing, you will receive six credits for English 001 and 002. You will, thereby, have completed the University's English requirement.

Foreign Language Credit

Credit in a foreign language will only be awarded to students with the appropriate scores on either the AP exam or SAT II test. Credit will not be granted on the basis of having native knowledge of a language other than English or on the basis of the number of years of high school study. If you wish to continue studying a language you studied in high school or your non-English native language, your placement in a Lehigh course will be determined on the basis of your prior experience. Music & Theatre

- You may select music lessons, and upon your arrival on campus you must go to the Music Department regarding registration status. Enrollment in music lessons is never guaranteed because of scheduling constraints.
- We encourage students with an interest in music to consider playing in one of the ensemble groups at Lehigh. Many of the ensembles require an audition to make sure you are playing in the group best suited to your interests. Auditions will be held during or shortly after Orientation in August. Check with the Music Department when you arrive on campus for the audition schedule. Marching Band and the Choral Union do not require auditions, so you can select them now.
- Performance (THTR 035) requires auditions. If you are interested in performing in one of the fall theatre productions, check with the Theatre Department when you arrive on campus for the audition schedule.

College Credit for Courses Taken While in High School

If, during your senior year, you studied a college course at another institution, you may be able to have credit transferred to your Lehigh degree program. You are responsible for ensuring that all necessary documents are provided. Such transfers are possible when *all* of the following criteria are met:

- 1. The course must be appropriate for Lehigh University (i.e., not at a lower level than Lehigh coursework; for example, "college algebra" is not appropriate).
- 2. The course must be a regular college course at the institution that offers it (not a special version of the course for high school students).
- 3. The grade assigned must be equivalent to a C or better on an official transcript sent directly to Lehigh. A grade of C- is not acceptable for transfer credit.
- 4. You must provide Lehigh with the course description and the textbook name and author. You may also be asked for a copy of the course syllabus.

Advanced Placement Credit

Please use the chart below to determine what Advanced Placement credit you may receive from various Lehigh departments. You must have your scores submitted directly to Lehigh (code 002365). Any delay in submitting your scores will impact your ability to register for courses.

International Baccalaureate

Students who earn the International Baccalaureate may be granted credit in higher-level or advanced subjects with scores of 5 or better or "B" or better. All students will have their credentials evaluated on an individual basis for specific course equivalency. Lehigh's Registration and Academic Services must receive the Official IB transcript before credit will be assigned.

VII. H.A.W.K.S. Peer Mentor Program

Transitioning to college can be challenging for first-year students. Recognizing the need to enhance and support students' retention in and outside of the College of Business & Economics, a peer mentor program was created and the H.A.W.K.S. were born.

The mission of <u>Helping Advise Willing & Keen Students</u> (H.A.W.K.S.) Peer Mentor Program is to connect CBE first-year and transfer students with other CBE scholars to assist in becoming acclimated to every aspect of Lehigh University. This yearlong program provides mentees with an early understanding of the University's academic and social atmosphere, helps address transitional issues of first-year mentees, and builds a personal connection between first-year and upper-class students.

All first-year students are <u>required</u> to participate in the program and are assigned a Peer Mentor who has a cohort of mentees with similar academic interests. Peer Mentors arrange individual and group meetings with their assigned mentees and participate in team-building activities, including interactive group events and topical discussions.

Our H.A.W.K.S. Peer Mentors will contact all first-year students in late July/early August to welcome them to Lehigh, introduce themselves, and offer to answer any Lehigh questions they might have. They will maintain contact throughout the summer. First-year students will meet their mentor and cohort of mentees during Convocation (August 24th).
